THE YELLOW DISCS IN THE MIDDLE OF THE FAIRWAY ARE 150 YARDS FROM THE CENTRE OF THE GREEN.

LOCAL RULES

1. THE LANE

Willow Lane – running through the course is "Abnormal Ground Conditions" where relief can be taken under Rule 16.1b, except when playing the 18th hole when the Lane becomes an integral part of the course.

2. OUT OF BOUNDS – (Rule 18.2b)

- Beyond any fence or wall defining the boundary of the course.
- Second Hole. A ball lying beyond the white posts surrounding the greenkeepers' shed.
- Ninth and Tenth Holes. A ball lying beyond the white posts, defining the practice ground.
- Tenth Hole. A ball, lying beyond the white posts behind and to the right of the green.

3. PRACTICE PUTTING GREEN

The practice putting green is a wrong green (Rule 13.1f applies).

4. STAKED TREES

Trees identified by stakes or plastic sheaths are "No Play Zones". If a player's ball lies anywhere on the course other than in a penalty area and it lies on or touches such a tree or such a tree interferes with the player's stance or area of intended swing, the player MUST take relief under Rule 16.1f.

5. IMMOVABLE OBSTRUCTIONS CLOSE TO THE PUTTING GREEN (Sprinkler Heads)

Relief from interference by an Immovable Obstruction may be taken under Rule 16.1. In addition, when a ball is in the General Area, if an immovable obstruction is on the line of play, within two club-lengths of the putting green, and within two club-lengths of the ball, the player may take relief under Rule 16.1b.

6. GROUND UNDER REPAIR

Areas marked with white lines are deemed to be "No Play Zones", and relief MUST be taken under Rule 16.1a (The exception being the White Lines surrounding the practice putting green designating the chipping area, where other than on the green, see 3 above, the ball shall be played as it lies).

7. TRACTOR MARKINGS

Deep rutted tractor marks and damage caused by horses' hoof prints are treated as Ground Under Repair (Abnormal Ground Conditions) and relief is allowed under Rule 16.1b.

PENALTY for the breach of these Local Rules not covered by a Rule of Golf:

Match Play - Loss of Hole;
Stroke Play - Two Strokes.

N.B. ALL GOLFERS MUST TAKE PARTICULAR CARE WHEN PLAYING SHOTS ADJACENT TO THE PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY CROSSING THE COURSE. THESE ARE THE SINGLE CARRIAGEWAY LANE (WILLOW LANE) AND THE PUBLIC FOOTPATH THAT CROSSES THE COUSE MARKED BY GREEN/YELLOW STAKES.

ABOVE & BEYOND

WILLIAM HERBERT FOWLER
(1856 – 1941)*

Herbert Fowler was one of the most renowned golf architects of the "Golden Era" immediately prior to World War I and widely recognized for his design of many of the best courses in Britain and the United States. These included Walton Heath, the Crystal Springs Course, San Francisco, the great Eastward Ho near Cape Cod, The Berkshire (Red & Blue), West Surrey and DeLamere Forest. Fowler was also asked to renovate a number of other famous courses including Royal North Devon, Royal Aberdeen, Royal Lytham & St. Annes and in 1922 he famously redesigned the 18th hole at Pebble Beach.

Fowler felt strongly that courses should follow the contours of the land and have a natural feeling, shunning the use of "man-made contrivances" and believing that topography could test the world's best golfers just as adequately. As he put it, "God builds golf links and the less man meddles the better for all concerned." In his description of Fowler's work, the dozen of writers on golf, Bernard Darwin, said "I never knew anyone who could more swiftly take on the possibilities of the ground".
